A Yes, right after July 6th I guess, somewhere around July 6th, Grayson Mercer and myself went to Sykesville and talked to her. The head nurse and doctors gave permission. She came and talked very nice. We told her all about the farm and she said she didn't expect anything out of it, and was willing for Mr. Burrier to sell it. We told her he wasn't making any profit, he was getting \$500 more than he paid for it, but the expenses were that much, and she said if he wasn't making anything off of it she didn't want anything, but she was perfectly satisfied, and she signed the deed witnessed by that lady nurse down there. Then Mr. Horman applied for a little loan from Mr. McSherry's bank, and Mr. McSherry said that deed wouldn't take care of it, so we went this way. And she used marks long before she ever went to Sykesville. She never did sign, did she?
