can you say about your sister's mental condition?

- A. We have a meat house, and a chicken house that is falling down, and a tool shed. All the buildings are in a poor state of repair.
- Q. Are there any modern improvements in the house?
- A. Nothing but electricity.
- C. I show you a copy of a Deed from Avery Browning, single, unto Fannie M D. Brandenburg and John J. Brandenburg, as joint tenants and not as tenants in common, dated August 2, 1944.

  Will you examine the deed, and state whether or not it correctly describes the real estate which your Mother owned at the time of her death?
- A. Yes, that is the Deed to Mother's property.
