"We have this Moment returned from the "Houghed Commons, and have the Pleafure (tho' but barely Time, as the Poff is juff going) to inform you, that by what we could observe, there is not the least Doubt but that the late "Definition on the North American Trade will Reftrictions on the North American Trade will be totally taken off, and *that* Trade both en-couraged and extended. We have Reafon to think that the Ministry are for repealing the Stamp Act. Mr. Putt, at different Times this Alternoon, fpoke at least Three Hours, like an Englishman, replete with true Principles of Li-berty. He infifts apon supporting the Sove-reignty of the Mother Country over the Colo. nies, but as warmly infifted upon the ill Policy, the Injuffice, and even Illegality, of taxing a " People who were not reprofented ; and concluded with giving it as his Opinion that the Stamp-Aft fhould be *tetaily repairs*." In Letters by Capt. Boyes there is mention made

In Letters by Capt. noyes there is mention maue of the Arrival of Col. George Mercer, at London, on the 2 th of January laft. At the Time thefe Letters were written nothing had transpired as to the Refolution of the Houfe of Commons concerning America, as they had not then gone through half the Papers that were laid before them ; however, it was the general Opinion that the Stamp-Act would be repealed, upon certain Conditions.
