Extract of a Letter from a House in London, to a Correspondent in Maryland, dated

December 14, 1765.
"We have just received here, by the New-York Mail, an Account of your Confusions on Account of the Stamp-Act taking Place. God grant they may hap-pily subside by the Removal of their Cause, since in our humble Opinion, a Multi-plicity of Taxes, can never consist with the Welfare of Colonies, whose very Exiftence, in a Trading View, must depend on being able to afford the Produce of their Lands cheap, to which Taxes can no more contribute, than it can be fupposed the Stamp-Act, if once admitted, wou'd be the only one which shou'd ever after be laid upon them. No, the Introduction of that wou'd ferve as a Precedent for others 'till the Colonies shou'd become as much Loaden and Fleeced by ministerial Dependents, as the Mother-Country is already.

The Lofs of Trade in General, must be the Consequence of such increasing Burdens, which introducing Poverty, may indeed the more readily subject the Freedom of the Nation to the all-grasping " Power of the C-, 'till Englishmen may in Time become as effectually inflaved as those of France are already: May Heaven avert that Worlt of Evils, and infpire thosellin superior Stations with a constant Conviction, that they only are the proper Rulers of a Nation, who by their Actions shew the Welfare of the People to be the only true and natural End of all Government
