

Shipp and all his goods againe, for w^{ch} fact the greatest fine that by y^e Lawes of that Country could be sett vpon any man was by the then Governo^r there imposed vpon Cornwallis and hee compelled to pay the same And then for the safety of his person enforct to trust his whole estate there wth a Servant and to flie hither wth Ingle in the same Shipp And when Cornwallis came into England Ingle gaue Testimony before a Co^mitte of his good affec^on to y^e Parliament and of his great sufferings for that Cause.

Afterwards Ingle goeing into those p^ts againe Cornwallis entrusted him here in London by way of Trade wth diuerse Co^modities to the value of about 200^l but Ingle kept the Com^modities, and takeing advantage of Cornwallis his absence landed some men nere his howse and rifled him to the value of 2500^{li} att the least And then returning into England complained before the Co^mitte of Examina^ons agst Cornwallis as an enemy to the State vainely hoping by that meanes to shelter himselfe from the Law, but vpon full debate of the businesse before that Co^mitte Cornwallis was referrd to his remedy att Law, and hath brought an ac^on att Lawe agst Ingle for the Co^modities deliuerd here, and p^cured a Co^mission out of the Chancery to examyne witnesses of the value of the goods taken away in Maryland.

To stay these p^ceedings Ingle caused Cornwallis to be laid in prison vpon 2 faigned ac^ons of 15000^{li} but Cornwallis by the helpe of his friendes gott out of prison And that piect faileing Ingle p^rferred a peti^on agst Cornwallis before the Lordes in Parliam^t And vpon fayned allega^ons hath p^cured an Order to stopp Cornwallis his p^ceedings att the Lawe till the matter conteyned in the peti^on be determined And nowe Ingle absents himselfe and p^secutes noe further vpon his peti^on. And now Cornwallis hath peti^oned the Lords that in regard hee hath attended seuerall dayes wth Councell and is noe longer able to beare that charge, that the businesse may be speedily heard and determined by their Lo^{pps} or that hee may be left att Liberty to try his ac^on att Lawe for the goods deliuered to Ingle here

Cap^t Cornwallis had planted himselfe in the P^vince of Mary Land in America And about two yeares since Ingle came thither as M^r of a Shipp to trade in those parts wth the English who had planted there. And was there arrested of high Treason and his Shipp and goodes seised, for some wordes w^{ch} hee had spoken agst the Kinge vpon a Comunic^acon of the differ-
