

to happen what we have & doe vnderstand herin is incerted & doe Conceiue th^t your Lo^p should haue thoughts for this prisoner with a present to his owne Country in hopes of purchaseing thereby, a peace w^{ch} by every one wee thinke is much required & most earnestly desired Iacob Clawson hath voluntarily & of his owne free will, declared to us his Redines to goe vpon your Comand, & shall to the Vtmost of his Ability for the Countrys sake) act & Assist any one th^t yo^r lo^p shall thinke fitt to Jmploy in a matter of soe great Consequence & further th^t he is verily pswaded th^t if such a thing were to be acted Ciuility in the behalfe of all the Sasq^esahanaes would alsoe goe & th^t thereby a peace might be procured the Sasq^esahanahs wee know would willingly Imbrace a peace if Obteyned but are vnwilling (through height of Spirit) to sue for itt Wee haue Credible Jnformacōn by a Gentl from the Manhattoes now here present who is thither wth all eppedicōn returning, th^t many of the Cenacoes will (through a Customary Trade) from the last of June vntill the Middle of July be at the fort at Arania to whome wee desired he would giue this Relacōn, th^t he saw one of their Countrymen (nameing his name th^t the English had taken, attempting to doe Mischeife & th^t he was well & fairly by the English dealt with all not after the manner & Cruelty, th^t they shewed to some of us w^{ch} they did form^{ly} take, & th^t there was great hopes th^t he would in some tyme come amongst th^m agayne, for by his kind vsage hitherto he Conceiued noe lesse Jff what wee haue done appears to your Lordshipp too much or too litle Wee haue nothing to plead but o^r ignorance humbly Craveing pardon your lordships in all due Obedience
