London Dec<sup>r</sup> 21<sup>st</sup> 1756.

Sir

I have ordered M<sup>r</sup> Lloyd, to pay you, the whole Revenue for the Support of Government, agreeable to the Law of 1704. & as he has Signified to me, that the twelve pence p<sup>r</sup> hogshead, may on Acc<sup>t</sup> of the small exportation of Tobacco this year; fall short of y<sup>r</sup> usual income; I have direct'd him to make it good to you in case that should happen & on the contrary if their remain any Over plus above £1000 p<sup>r</sup> Ann: I Expect y<sup>r</sup> Acc<sup>t</sup> to me thereof, by Bills of Exchange; there being many charges, attending the Government & the property of the Province, w<sup>ch</sup> that ought in part to Support
