By his Ex<sup>ncy</sup> the Gou<sup>r</sup>no<sup>r</sup> & Councill in Assembly May 18<sup>th</sup> 1692.

Message from the Gouverno<sup>r</sup> & Councill brought by Coll  
Hutchings & Cap<sup>t</sup> Courts which was Read as follows, Viz<sup>t</sup>

By his Ex<sup>ncy</sup> the Gouverno<sup>r</sup> and Councill in Assembly  
May 19<sup>th</sup> 1692.

The Bill for takeing away Erro<sup>rs</sup> in proceedings &c<sup>a</sup> and for  
Releife ag<sup>t</sup> the Act of Limitation hath been twice read, and  
approoued off, as very Necessary to be passed into an Act.
