R. which the s^d Carville said, neither my Lord nor Coll Digges was to have any Consideration for their land, this Dep^t replied there was noe such thing mentioned in the Act of Assembly, the said Carville replied that was true, but my Lord did wyerdraw the Assembly, but it should not be soe, for he would justifie that his L^{spp} and Coll Digges had given their land gratis to the Countrey; And further the said Carville discoursed of and concerning his L^{dsp}s Councill, that Maj^r Sewall and M^r John Darnall were but Boyes, and what was Coll Darnall or Coll Digges, he this Dep^t replied they were his betters or words to that effect, The said Carville answered that my Lord putt none in Office but knaves and fooles, and that he had made three or ffour Sheriffes, nameing this Dep^t Majo^r Taylors Sonn & Coll Burges's Sonn, who were knaves and fooles, for he put none else into Office, some of the Company replied that his L^{spp} had a kindness for this Dep^t the said Carville replied it was because he this Dep^t cheated the Countrey: This Dep^t answered that the sayd Carville might say what he pleased, being in this Dep^{ts} house, but desired M^r Pile and M^r Bowling to take cognizance how the s^d Carville had abused his L^{spp}, for that he would informe against him; the s^d Pile and Bowling replied they were sorry he was soe bitter against his L^{spp}, ffor that they never heard any pson speake such words before; ffor such words against his L^{dsp} and Officers in some Company was enough to make a disturbance in the Countrey comeing from such a man as he: And further this Deponent Saith that upon nameing my Lords name it was answered a ffart, and that it was said there was little difference betweene him meaneing my Lord and a ffart or words to that effect and farther saith not

The Deposition of Cap^t James Bowling taken
this 11th Day of January Anno 1683:

This Dep^t saith that upon the 4th Day instant he this Dep^t being at the house of M^r Joshua Doyne in company of M^r Thomas Mudd, M^r Joseph Pile and M^r Robert Carville, wee fell into discourse about laying out the Towne lands, And he this Dep^t said that it would be convenient that his L^{spp} should be there to lett them know what parcell of that Land should be Assigned for a Towne and to lett the purchasers know the price of it, upon which the said Carville made answer that that needed not, for to his certain knowledge that his L^{dsp} in the Assembly had promised to give soe much land as should be
