The Deposition of M<sup>r</sup> Thomas Mudd taken  
this 11<sup>th</sup> of January 1683:

This Dep<sup>t</sup> saith that upon the fourth instant this Dep<sup>t</sup> being at the house of M<sup>r</sup> Joshua Doyne, there being at that time M<sup>r</sup> Joseph Pile, Cap<sup>t</sup> James Bowling and M<sup>r</sup> Robert Carvile, that this Dep<sup>t</sup> did then heare the s<sup>d</sup> Carvile say that he remembered that my Lord and Coll Digges had promised to the Assembly that what land of theirs happened to be allotted for Towne lands, they would freely give, and further this Dep<sup>t</sup> Saith not

The Deposition of M<sup>r</sup> Joseph Pile taken this  
11<sup>th</sup> Day of January Anno 1683:

This Dep<sup>t</sup> saith that upon the fourth day instant this Dep<sup>t</sup> being at the house of M<sup>r</sup> Joshua Doyne, in Company of M<sup>r</sup> James Bowling, M<sup>r</sup> Thomas Mudd, & M<sup>r</sup> Robert Carvile there happened a discourse about the Act for Advancem<sup>t</sup> of Trade, and the s<sup>d</sup> Carvile said that my Lord must give his Land, and it was replied why must he, the said Carvile made answer because he had promised it, answer was made that it did not appeare by the words of the Act, the said Carvile replied, this is a brave way of wyer drawing, to make fair promises to work their owne Ends, and not performe: upon discourse afterwards touching the Secrys raiseing their ffees for drawing and recording Pattents, the s<sup>d</sup> Carvile said that if it was not for him, that there was not a mann in the Countrey that durst Speake in his owne Right, the s<sup>d</sup> Carvile further
