Produced & Read a Letter by the hono^{ble} Coll John Addison Rec^d of yesterdays Date from Charles County, giving an Acco^t of one of the Men belonging to the Garrison there being lately killed by Indians; Ordered therevpon that the s^d Coll Addison go & inquire of the Empero^r of piscattoway thereabout & forthwith give Notice of the s^d Murder to the inhabitants of the Colony of Virginia & Raise Ten or a dozen men to secure the Garrison whilst the Rangers go out in pursuit of the Murderers, and that he furnish them with powder & Amunition necessary; and if occasion Require, to Raise more force & send his Ex^{ncy} speedy Word, who will come in person.

Coll Beale Order^d to Raise Men vpon the above occasion, if necessary

Coll Ninian Beale was sent for who came, vnto whom the afores^d Letter was also Read; Wherevpon his Ex^{ncy} told him, th^t he being more peculiarly Commissionated to looke after such like Matters, was therefore Ordered to take all speedy & imaginable care therein, and to Raise what Men he found necessary vpon that occasion.
