As the general Expectation was, that the Army was and would be fully provided with Cloathing, by the Means adopted by Congress, our Assembly made no Provisions in their last Session, for our Troops and it is now impossible to have a Session in Time to provide for this Occasion, wherefore we have resolved to procure what Cloathing we can, though we fear it may be short of what may be absolutely necessary, relying that the next Assembly will approve a Measure so essential to the
