Then sent to the house Delegates the ffollowing Message viz^t

By his Ex^{cy} the Gov^r and Councill in Assembly Novemb the 10th 1698.

Proposed that for the Support of poor Diseased and lame persons, If it shall please God that the Coole Springs do continue to make the like Cures as lately that the house would appropriate one hundred pounds of the mony that is in Bancke (besides the £800 now allotted toward the Discharge of the Levy) for the building of small Tenements at the s^d Coole Springs for the Entertainm^t of such lame diseased pesons as shall restore thither for Cure of their Lameness & Diseases

It is hoped that before the Sev'all Acts for Imposicons & are expired there will arise thereon to the Country near eight or nine hundred pounds Sterl
