This House have read and Considered the message touching the Bill for regulating ordinaries on the back of the bill and if the making the Law for a short time as proposed by the honble Council is thought of weight to move this House to Consent to them additional words we hope may have as Strong Effect to move your honour to Concur with the house in leaving them out for so short Time for since by the Time her Majesties Pleasure can be known the Law will Expire, and 'tis agreed that 'till then the fines arising shall be applied to the Counties and therefore tis but saying what we all intend to do and this method proposed is altogether new and that Contained in the bill agreeable to all other Laws but not one in the whole province having such a reserve nor can we suppose that her Majesty enjoyns any such reserve, but in what shall be reserved to her Majesties Governour and therefore this House does earnestly pray the honble Council's Considerations and Concurrence with this House therein
