Whereas it appears by the Journal of the Committee for laying the Levy last year that Col^o Dorsey in the Right of his Son Samuel Dorsey was 20^{lb} Sterling for one years Rent of the House It's therefore ordered that the Treasurer pay the same to Samuel Dorsey according to the Vote of this House and not to the Exx of the said Col^o Dorsey.
