Cap^t Docwra and M^r Charles Wright bring up from the U. H. J. House of Delegates—

A Bill prohibitting the Exportation of Hides and old Iron Read in their House the first and Second times & Endorsed will pass

The said Bills being read at the Board the first Time were returned to the House with some Amendments thereto by Col Tilghman

The Board adjourned till nine of the Clock to Morrow Morning

Tuesday November the 11th 1712

The Council Sate Present as yesterday

Mr James Lloyd and five other Delegates bring up the Bill for restraining the Inhabitants of this Province from Selling any Quantity of Liquors to the Indians &c and the following message Viz.

By the House of Delegates
November the 11th 1712

We have considered and debated the message and Bill Sent from your Honble Board yesterday by Col Whittington and John Hall Esq^r relating to the Indians but not being Satisfyed with the Reasons inducing your Honours to recommend that Bill as it is drawn & taking the same to be of great Concernment and being willing to Shew due respect to what P. 772 comes from your honble Board have thought it reasonable to agree to the first Paragraph thereof with these Amendm¹⁵

Viz. That the fine be recovered in any County Court in this Province

That it be to the use of the County

But as to the last paragraph thereof relating to false news and rumours &c We think it may be rejected for that it will be of ill Consequence and we are willing a Clause should be added to prohibit any Inhabitants from trusting any Indians for any Liquors or taking any pawn from them for any debt and from buying their Guns Match Coats &c on pain of returning them and losing their Debts upon which Amendm's we are willing to agree to the Bill. We concur with you that it is necessary the Indians be acquainted with the Penaltys our Laws inflict on the Breakers of them in such manner as you prescribe
