L. H. J. Oppression her Majesty's poor Subjects labour under by the Lib. 41 unreasonableness of their Attendance on the Provincial Courts and the great ffees that are there taken. We believe the Honble President hath now as full Instructions as any Capt. General can expect to pass any Bills of absolute Necessity being invested with a Negative Voice. And if your Honours will assert your own Authority and the Dignity of your Board to remove this and other great Aggrievances we have to lay before you it will be no Breach but a Performance of your Duty to her Majesty a real and not feigned Intent and Desire to serve the Country in which you have a great Interest and more Reputation than so nicely to insist on and deny any Thing that tends to ease the Inhabitants of this Province when the same interferes with the Interest of some particular Perp. 346 sons. But if your Honours think it more necessary and will consent that a new Bill may be past to remedy those Aggrievances (tho' under some other Title) we shall readily concur with you therein, if not, we desire we may not stay here to no Purpose and spend our Time and the Country's Money we being resolved to proceed in no other Matter until we know your Resolution herein the Business of this House being as well to ease the Inhabitants of their grievous and unmerciful Oppressions as to raise a Supply to defray the Charge of the Country
