That whereas the publick Library is observed to go to Decay your Petitioners therefore humbly beg your Honours to take it into Consideration and use such Methods for the Preservation of it as to your Honours shall seem most necessary in Order to which we conceive it convenient to appoint a Library keeper who may be obliged to take Care of it and that he may be encouraged so to do to make him some Allowance for the same And further to take Notice of the Methods used by the Roman Priests to pervert her Majesty's Subjects from the ffaith of the Church of England to that of Rome especially in the City where is the Seat of Government and your Pet<sup>r</sup>s shall ever pray &<sup>ta</sup>
