Colonies must bear at least the greatest share of Charge for whose Protection the Force will be Established, this will occasion a Tax; being Preparative is best. It is usual on Propositions concerng the Colonies, such Propositions are often sent to the Secys & Agents of the Provinces to make answer concern^g; if any sho^d be, I believe it will. Y^r advice on Modus of Tax pr Poll, by Land Tax or otherways. Yr answer by paymt Sterle would be of great Utility here relative to Maryland, & by whom to be rec^d & in whose hands Deposit'd. I hint this for y' consideration at Leasure & should be oblig'd for y' sentiments thereon, from Gov' Denny late of Pensilvania are arrived transactions, sd his Gain of Malum Penæ and Malum Culpæ to his Proprietors, whom I am told will sue him on Breach of his Covenant by Bond to them; even his friends sneer him. Great Preparations by Land & Sea are forwarding for Action early in the Spring.
