ingly have passed a Vote on it, I must Observe to you that U. H. J. the house have not duly Considered that Law and also that the Law was Enacted when the Government was Imediately under the Crown and Still lyes before it for its Assent or Dissassent.

Againe I Cannot take such Persons to be Friends either to the Lord Proprietor or the Country who woud have his Lordship's Inclinations alone (tho in an Instruction) to have the Sanction of a Law.

In a word I insist upon it that the 3<sup>d</sup> p Tonn is due to me as Gov<sup>r</sup> untill my Comission is Legally Superseeded & resolve to take all proper measures to maintain it.
