We also find that M<sup>r</sup> Vachael Denton was sworn Clerk of the Provincial Court the Eighteenth Day of July 1718 That after being sworn Clerk he Entered Several Judgments which Ought To have p. 575 been done by M<sup>r</sup> John Beale his Predecessor in the said Office Containing 315 folios in Lib V D N° 3 And also Alphabetted four of the said M<sup>r</sup> Beales Books of Judgments.

We further find that the Judgments appear to be regularly Entered by the said M<sup>r</sup> Denton from the time he was Sworn into the said office till within October Court 1725 Except in those Causes where Declara-
