And when the s^d Wicks came home & understood of her disease; hee used all lawfull wayes & meanes to gett her cured, by applying himselfe to Cap^t fuller, & this Depon^{ts} then husband who did undertake to use their best skill & endeauo^{rs} for her cure, And this Depon^t doth further depose, th^t during the time th^t the s^d Seruant lyued wth the s^d Wicks, w^{ch} was to this Depon^{ts} best remembrance about six or seauen months, during w^{ch} time the s^d seruant was in a uery loathsome, stinking & perishing condicōn, & was uery offensiuē. loath-
