M<sup>r</sup> Hammond from the Committee of Laws delivers M<sup>r</sup> Speaker  
a Bill entituled, An Act for Limitation of Officers Fees.

On Motion of a Member Leave is given to bring in a Bill for  
erecting a Publick School in Worcester County.

M<sup>r</sup> Speaker communicates to the House the following Message  
from the Governor, in answer to their Address on his Speech  
Gentlemen of the Lower House of Assembly.

Your Address gives me much Satisfaction, as I find in it a strong  
Sense of Duty and Zeal for the Person and Dignity of our most  
gracious Sovereign; and an Abhorrence of that wicked and de-  
testable Rebellion carried on by the avowed Enemies of Liberty and
