Who made Choice of Mr Richard Dorsey for their Clerk & then proceeded to Business; When the Conferees of the Upper House proposed that the Duration that the Bill should have be first Considered upon which the Conferees agreed to Resort back to their respective Houses for Information therein

At the next Meeting the Conferees of the Lower House said that it was the Opinion of their House that the Bill should have its duration for seven Years and to the end of the next Session of Assembly which should happen after the Expiration of the said seven Years which the Conferees of the Upper House declared to be agreable to the sence of their House
