The Assembly here have evaded Providing Battoes Cannoes and other necessaries for transporting their own People into Canada, that I shall be obliged to procure them at the Charge of the Crown rather than let the Service Suffer, which I believe is not expected and as these things will be counted for the transporting all the Troops that are to be raised and rendezvous at Albany I conclude it will not be improper in you to give the necessary Directions to Provide what may be wanted on the part of your Government as soon as may be.
