And an Ingrossed Bill, entituled An Act to prohibit the Raising L.H.J. of Swine and Geese, in Princess Ann Town, in Somerset County; Liber No. 34 were Severally Read and Assented to, and sent to the Upper House, with the Paper Bills, by Capt. Tilghman and M^r Mills.
