A Bill, entituled, An Act to prevent certain Evils and Inconveniencies attending the sale of strong Liquors, and Running of Horse Races near the Yearly meetings of the people called Quakers &c. was read the first time, and Ordered to lie on the Table.

The Bill, entituled, An Act for the Benefit of the poor, and Encouragement of Industry; was read the second time, and will not pass.

M^r Hammond, from the Committee of Laws, delivers to M^r Speaker an Address to the Governor; which was Read, approved and Ordered to be Ingrossed.
