Serg^t William Morgan of the Maryland Artillery one Blanket and also to Col^o Adams, Linen for two shirts in part of the Articles allowed him by the General Assembly for the year 1781

That the Issuing Commissary send fifteen bushels of Salt to John Smith Brookes upper Marlborough

That Christopher Edelin Esquire Collector of the Tax for Frederick County pay to George Murdock Esquire Commissary for supplying the Convention Troops Thirty thousand pounds on Account.

That the western shore Treasurer deliver to Col^o Uriah Forrest one hundred and fifty hh^{ds} of Tobacco on Account

The Treasury is at so low an Ebb that it will not enable us to furnish you with any Money. If the Collector of Frederick County should have it in his Power to supply you with more than we have directed, on Application from you, we shall order a further sum.
