You should have delivered it over to the Person appointed by Congress or M<sup>r</sup> Morris, to receive it at Elk. The State shall not be at the additional Expence of transporting Flour to Philadelphia, which will not be received, and we desire that no Flour be forwarded, nor even delivered at Elk to the Continent, 'til you have our further Orders or 'til you hear from the Commissary General.
