[Council to Delegates in Congress.]

We are sorry to be again under the Necessity of troubling you on a Subject which has already been the Occasion of so many Letters. Your Favor of the 12th ult^o refers us to the Secretary at War for the Result of our Application of the 28th Jan^y last, to Congress, for a considerable Supply of Arms and Cloathing, which we claimed as due to this State. We are informed from the War Office, that all we have to expect, is about three hundred Suits of Cloathing, which were ordered to be sent on, and even this paltry Supply, we have not yet received. We must therefore once more solicit your Attention to our Demands upon the United States. Were it the Practice of all the States to cloath, equip and Arm their Troops, we should do it without Reluctance; but to be called upon by Congress for Monies to procure the very Articles, which we are also under the Necessity of furnishing specifically, is too unreasonable and cannot be submitted to

We have not yet received the three hundred Suits of Cloathing you informed us in your Letter of the 14th ult^o, you had ordered to be sent on for the Recruits of this State. Unequal as this very small Supply will be to our Occasions, and to what we have a Right to expect and claim, we wish it may be forwarded immediately; as we have a Number of Recruits greatly distressed for Cloathing, who can neither be disciplined in the State, nor sent out of it, in their present Condition. We shall expect the Honor of hearing from you very shortly and are with great Respect &^{ca}
