For the Reasons contained in your Letter, and it being neither good Policy, nor the Interest of any Government to oppress their Citizens, and as the Delay can be attended with no real Disadvantage to the State, but the Contrary; as the Money that might be brought into the Treasury by Executions, cannot be used, and must remain in the Treasury, at a Time when the People are experiencing the greatest Evils from the Want of a sufficient circulating Medium, of which the Assembly were so sensible that, at their last Sitting, they passed an Act preventing Creditors, many of whom are Purchasers of Confiscated Property, from bringing Suits, 'til January 1784. For these Reasons and others, equally powerful, which might be urged, it is our Opinion that you should suspend issuing Executions 'til the Meeting of the Assembly.
