That the said Treasurer pay to Heber Whittingham, ten Pounds, ten shillings specie agreeable to the Act to adjust the Debts due from [this State] per Accounts passed.—

We expected the Barges under your Command would have proceeded on their Cruize before this; we apprehend many bad Consequences from their remaining here, and request that they may sail immediately. If Captⁿ Spedden's Barge is absent, Orders must be left for him to follow you. We understand there is a French Sloop, waiting off the Harbour for the Barges; if so, it is the more necessary that you proceed without Delay.
