The Court sat almost a Month and no Demand being made they took his Recognizance to appear at their next General Court which will be held the second Tuesday in October next.

When I did myself the Honor of writing to your Judges on the 20th of May our Court was then setting and M^r Carbury was in Custody ready to be delivered up.—

I have given the above Detail in order to account for not having M^r Carbury on the Spot to deliver up to your Officer M^r Bullfinch.

M^r Carbury shall be immediately informed of your Demand and I have every Reason to think he will voluntarily attend your Judges and surrender himself up. If he does not our Judges on his appearance at the next General Court will deliver him up to the Executive of this State who will forward him to the Limits, giving your Excellency previous Notice of the Time and place so that your Officers may meet our's and receive him into Custody.

I have lately received a Letter from the President of Pennsylvania demanding that you be delivered up according to the Articles of Confederation to take your Trial in that State for the Offences with which you are Charged to have there committed and for which you were arrested in this State, and are now held in Custody. I wrote the President for Answer that I had every reason to think there would be no necessity for compulsory Measures for that as soon as you were made acquainted with the Demand you would Voluntarily go to the City of Philadelphia, and surrender yourself up to the Judges: their Courts will be held, I am informed on the 16th of the present Month.

It will save you a considerable Expence to go voluntarily, and it will be a favorable Circumstance in your Case: and it will give me much pleasure to be relieved from the necessity of forcible and violent Measures.
