The Condiçon of this p<sup>nt</sup> obligaõn is such th<sup>t</sup> if th<sup>e</sup> aboues<sup>d</sup> John Edmundson & Francis Armestronge doe well & truely make good according to Law, unto Thomas Bisse his heyres exequuto<sup>rs</sup> admist<sup>r</sup>ors or assignes Thirteene hund<sup>d</sup> Acres of Land Lying uppon th<sup>e</sup> North side of th<sup>e</sup> Riuer called Choptanck, Bownded uppon both sides w<sup>th</sup> Two Creeks, & gyuen in to Andrew Skinner, to bee called Little Bristol, & a Pattent gyuen, & sent for England by th<sup>e</sup> John & Mary att their owne proper Charge, w<sup>th</sup>out all other Charge whatsoever then this obligaõn to bee in force, otherwise to bee Voyd, as wittnes my hand th<sup>e</sup> day & yeare as aboue written.

D<sup>r</sup> Luke Barber d<sup>e</sup>ft } his Charge ag<sup>st</sup> th<sup>e</sup> p<sup>if</sup> being read ouer, The  
p<sup>if</sup> by Elionor Spinke (her husband being absent) by her Attoney Vid. fol. 116.  
Co<sup>tt</sup> Will<sup>m</sup> Euans, sayth th<sup>t</sup> whereas the d<sup>e</sup>ft hauing taxed th<sup>e</sup> p<sup>if</sup> & fol. 158  
in open Court, affirming th<sup>t</sup> her oath was false & malitious is matter  
of ffact: & therefore desyreth th<sup>e</sup> Board to deliuer their opinion &  
Judgm<sup>t</sup> in th<sup>e</sup> same. And after some Debate in th<sup>e</sup> Cause, The  
Judgm<sup>t</sup> of th<sup>e</sup> Board is, That if D<sup>r</sup> Barber uttered those words after  
th<sup>e</sup> s<sup>d</sup> Elionor had taken & gyuen in her oath in Court it ought to bee  
iudged & esteemed as matter of ffact. Then th<sup>e</sup> p<sup>if</sup> craues a Jury,  
w<sup>ch</sup> was graunted.

Edward Clarke sworne & examined in open Court sayth That  
after Elionor Spinke had deliuered in her oath, D<sup>r</sup> Barber threw it,  
to M<sup>r</sup> Hall, & bid him Record them, for they were false & malicious,  
& hee did not question but to proue her periured/ & further sayth  
not/

M<sup>r</sup> Walter Hall sworne & examined likewise in open Court sayth, [p. 197]  
That after Elionor Spinke was sworne the Doctor gaue this Depon<sup>t</sup>  
Two Depos<sup>ns</sup> the one being Elionor Spinke, & bad mee Record  
them, & bee Carefull of them: ffor hee would proue them false &  
malicious, And made noe Doubt but to gett under th<sup>e</sup> L<sup>d</sup> Chancelo<sup>rs</sup>  
of England his hand to punish such malitious p<sup>s</sup>ons as those were,  
& further sayth not/
