

Liber F F arrowes, Amongst w<sup>ch</sup> Indians this Depon<sup>t</sup> doth declare that th<sup>e</sup> Indian now in Custody by name Chotyke was one of them th<sup>t</sup> shott after th<sup>e</sup> mayd, But for any of th<sup>e</sup> other Three this Depon<sup>t</sup> cannot say hee knew any of them, hauing noe time to peruse them, Then this Depon<sup>t</sup> hollowes, Vppon w<sup>ch</sup> th<sup>e</sup> Indians runne back to th<sup>e</sup> top of th<sup>e</sup> hill & shott about halfe a score arrowes att him before any of th<sup>e</sup> rest came up to him, Then after they were all come up, These s<sup>d</sup> Indians shott about fowrty arrowes att them, Then this Depon<sup>t</sup> made up to recouer th<sup>e</sup> howse: w<sup>ch</sup> they did hinder by comming betweene him & th<sup>e</sup> howse, in w<sup>ch</sup> time this Depon<sup>t</sup> w<sup>th</sup> th<sup>e</sup> rest did enspect John Gabinnett w<sup>th</sup> a Gun, came up M<sup>rs</sup> Langworths eldest Girle being chased before by th<sup>e</sup> s<sup>d</sup> Indians, Then th<sup>e</sup> Indians all fall a hollowing & running downe th<sup>e</sup> hill forced them back againe to Bennett Marchegays Plantāon, And when they desisted in pursueing them th<sup>e</sup> afores<sup>d</sup> Indian Chotyke shott an arrow att this Depon<sup>t</sup> w<sup>ch</sup> hee did defend w<sup>th</sup> a Tobacco stick in his hand, when they mett w<sup>th</sup> John Gabinnett w<sup>th</sup> his gun, whereuppon they all run away, & further this Depon<sup>t</sup> sayth nott.

Bennett Marchegay aged 32 yeares or thereabouts sworne on th<sup>e</sup> 27<sup>th</sup> day of Septemb<sup>r</sup> 1665 sayth,

That this Depon<sup>t</sup> was in his Tob. grownd w<sup>th</sup> his Poep<sup>l</sup>e & Thomas Hailings comming by This Depon<sup>t</sup> askd him to pype it, And while they were pyping hee was saying, what doe yo<sup>w</sup> thinke of th<sup>e</sup> Indians? now they are all gone to Pascattoway & deserted their Towne: And doe uerily beleiue th<sup>t</sup> as soone as their meetings are broake up that they will giue us a Clap. The word was noe sooner out of his mouth but they heard M<sup>rs</sup> Langworth Cry away, away, Indians, Indians, soe I bad th<sup>e</sup> folks run & hollow & this Depon<sup>t</sup> would follow them after hee had fetched his Broad Axe, w<sup>ch</sup> hee did & spoake to John Gabinnett to goe & fetch his gun, & follow them. And when this Dep<sup>t</sup> w<sup>th</sup> th<sup>e</sup> rest of th<sup>e</sup> English came into M<sup>rs</sup> Langworth Plantāon, they saw fflower Indians w<sup>ch</sup> when they saw th<sup>e</sup> English they fell a running to th<sup>e</sup> top of a Hill amongst w<sup>ch</sup> th<sup>t</sup> Indian Chotyke, now in custody, was one, for th<sup>e</sup> other Three this Depon<sup>t</sup> did not well know, hauing not time nor opportunity to come neare enough to them. Then they faced about, & seing th<sup>t</sup> this Depon<sup>t</sup> w<sup>th</sup> th<sup>e</sup> rest was unarmed, they came running downe th<sup>e</sup> Hill againe in pursuite of them, [p. 73] untill they were forced to retreete to this Depon<sup>ts</sup> Plantāon, in w<sup>ch</sup> interim this Depon<sup>t</sup> did see M<sup>rs</sup> Langworths eldest daughter run through the Indians, towards them for shelter, w<sup>ch</sup> made this Depon<sup>t</sup> stay th<sup>e</sup> longer to saue her, And then came up John Gabinnett w<sup>th</sup> a gun, & bid him pursue th<sup>e</sup> Indians, while hee went to his howse to see his wife, & further this Depon<sup>t</sup> sayth nott.
