to the aforesd Francis Chattles (tht is to say) two Cowes bigge with Liber F Calfe to the value of two thousand pounds of tobaccoe at the plantation of Mr Benjamin Rozer called the Indian Feilds, conditionally that hee the sd Francis should & would deliver unto him the sd William two other Cowes (in exchange for the sd Cowes) at Mattawoman when hee should be thereunto required, & tht they should be such Cowes as hee the sd William should well like of, or deliver backe the sd Cowes with calves of the sd William: But hee the sd Francis (though often required) hath not delivered the sd Cowes in exchange. nor rendred backe unto the sd William the Cowes which hee soe received of him, but to render & redeliver doth deny & unjustly deteines, Whereupon hee sayth hee is damnified & hath damage to the value of two thousand pounds of tobacco And thereupon hee brings his suite

The Defendant Francis Goodricke by Geo: Thompson his Atturney saves tht the sd Francis Goodricke is in noe way Gilty of the aforesd transgression & of this hee putts himselfe upon the Countrey

Matthew Saunders sworne & examined in open Court as on the behalfe of the Defendant, (sayth) sayth the about sometimes in Feb as Francis Goodrick & hee on a sunday came from Church they called at William Boydens at Mr Rozers Indian Feilds, Francis [p.9] Goodricke told him hee had two Cowes at Mattawoman, & askt William Boyden if hee were willing to change with him, & soe William Boyden went & shewed him on Cow in the Corn feild & told him tht the other was on the hill by Philip Brownes, & on the munday Francis Goodricke came & Compleated the bargaine, And William Boyden tooke his as dellivered & Francis Goodricke his as delivered. & William Boyden desired him to take his away as soon as hee could & further sayth not

Andrew Wheatley aged about 22 yeares sworne & examined in open Court sayth there was a Couple of Cowes at Mattawoman went under the notion of Francis Goodrickes, & they sd the Francis Goodricke & William Boyden had chang'd & on of them was swampt after Christmas & William Boyden s<sup>d</sup> if hee pleased hee could turn these Cowes into the hands of Francis Goodricke again, but hee would not shew himselfe such a knave & at the opening of the yeare William Boyden desired the other to be putt into the pasture & further sayth not

A jury being impanelled & sworne & the Wittnesses examined, the plaintiffe William Boyden lett the suite fall, & the Defendant Francis Goodricke obteined a nonsuite agt the plaintiffe with cost of suite
