Our last Message contained the Propositions, which our Conferrees would have been instructed to make, had a Conference taken Place, p. 165 according to any of the Precedents we have pointed out. The Election we are willing to extend to all Persons as well Plante[r]s as others, to discharge all ffees and the Poll Tax in Tobacco or Money, as might occasionally best suit them, would be an effectual Reduction of ffees, and contribute very much to the Ease and Convenience of the People; but we think the new Regulation you have proposed, would reduce them so low as not to leave a sufficient and proper Support for the Officers.
