satisfies our hunger is taxed; everything is taxed. No man is so much dreaded and shunned as the tax-gatherer. The rich hide themselves to escape his inquisitorial visits. The poor meet him with sad and angry countenance. His presence is everywhere and among all men, like the blight that kills and the postilence that desolates, and leaves little else than grief and suffering.
