And whereas some Doubts may possibly arise about the Construction of the said recited Clause, and whether the Perfon so Killing such Slave as aforesaid making Resistance, shall undergo any Prosecution for the same: For the Explanation whereof, and to prevent all Disputes or Doubts which may arise concerning the said Clause;

Passed 17th Nov. 1753. An ACT to prevent Injuring the Navigation to Baltimore-Town, and to the Inspecting House at Elk-Ridge Landing, on Patapsco River. Lib. H.S. fol. 117.

Preamble.

HEREAS it is represented to this General Assembly, That by Opening and Digging into the Banks of Patapfco River, for Iron Stone, large Quantities of Earth and Sand are thrown and washed into the said River, and Navigable Branches thereof, by which Practice (if continued), the Channel of the said River, and Navigable Branches aforefaid, will, in a short Time, be so filled up, that Vessels of any Burthen must be prevented from coming into the best and most secure Harbours in the said River, and the Navigation thereof greatly obstructed: For Remedy of which Evil, it is prayed that it may be Enacted;
