while all of us know that things have not been good in many of our Maryland communities, we know, too, that in general they are not so bad as they have been elsewhere in the nation. This new plant will surely do its share in increasing employment in the Cambridge area.

I feel that this move to Maryland, by one of the members of a select "Who's Who" of American industry—the Dorsett Marine Division of the Textron Corporation—is an augury of more good things to come for Dorchester County and all of Maryland.

This fine firm is especially welcome in a State that has long respected and appreciated quality in all things.

To the officials of Textron, to the staff of Dorsett Marine, I say "Welcome to Maryland!" We are deeply pleased to have you come. We hope your stay will be long and profitable and that you will find Maryland a good place in which to live and work.

This Maryland flag which has been flown over the State House in Annapolis is a symbol of our hearty welcome to you and of our wish for your successful future in Maryland.

## REMARKS, DEDICATION OF CARLING BREWING COMPANY, BALTIMORE

June 16, 1961

I know that I voice the sentiment of all Marylanders when I say that, as Governor, I am delighted to welcome the Carling Brewing Company to our prosperous and growing industrial family. I recall that I was here a little more than a year and a half ago to break ground on this site, and it is most gratifying to observe the work that has been done since that time in the erection of this magnificent industrial plant . . . .

This handsome and modern brewing plant, representing an investment of \$16 million, stands as a symbol of the confidence the Carling Brewing Company has in the State of Maryland and its future.
