and Congressman Morton named as possible Republican candidates. Has your search gone beyond that?

- A. Well, there are a lot of Republicans who are interested. The two you have mentioned, and Delegate J. Glenn Beall, Jr., is of course a possiblility, and there are others who are interested. I only wish we had two or three seats, because I think we have some pretty good candidates that we could run. I don't want to see them get in each other's way.
- Q. Governor, Senator Percy came to Baltimore the other day and sounded very much like a candidate. He kept on telling us what he would do if given a chance. How do you feel about Senator Percy as a Republican nominee?
- A. Well I think Senator Percy is a very attractive candidate. I think he's a possibility at this point. We're shaking down a rather formidable list of possibilities, and I certainly wouldn't want to indicate any elimination of Senator Percy. He has a wide public appeal, and he's a good man.
