These are but the highlights of our achievements and our aspirations, a stimulating record for the present and a prod to greater action and initiative in the future. We are moving Maryland forward responsibly, solvently and imaginatively.

This, fellow Kiwanians, in part explains and excuses my absence from meetings, my life confined to State Circle. While I recognize and regret the limits upon my private life, there is compensation in personal pride for I have shared in the making of unprecedented progress in Maryland. Each of you dedicates a portion of your private life to serve your community, thus assuring more opportunities and greater fulfillment for others. I stand committed to continue this principle—to realize the ideals we share—to build greater opportunities for the security and fulfillment of our almost four million citizens through positive service to our State.
