ect. The 110-mile-per-hour service, which ultimately is to reach 150 miles per hour, is to start the last Sunday in April.

The crossings affected are on county roads in Cecil, Harford, Baltimore, Anne Arundel, and Prince George's counties.

The only crossings on State highways are on Maryland 193, Glendale Road, in Prince George's, and Belair Avenue in Aberdeen, Harford County.

Governor Agnew said he regards the new controls planned by the State Roads Commission as only a temporary answer to the problem and that he will continue to work, with the assistance of Maryland Congressmen, for Federal funding of grade separations.
