work for the type bill that I supported. The same thing applies to some of the other measures you mentioned. Implied consent — this has been in the Legislature for years and years, so why should its failure for maybe the fourth or fifth time be laid to the Governor's program? It's a bill I've taken on because I think it's good, and will continue to work for it. Some of these things have to be presented several times before they can get through.
