Summoned Impanelled & Sworne upon their oaths say  
that they finde for y<sup>e</sup> pl<sup>t</sup> to be paid for his Corne with Cost  
of suite, therefore his Co<sup>rs</sup> and<sup>er</sup> Tho: Kingd to pay the Sampin  
or his ord<sup>r</sup> two hundred pound of good bound tobacco
