

VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS, NOVEMBER SESSION, 1800. 81

The bill prescribing the form of the bond to be hereafter given by the clerks of the several counties of this state, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate by the clerk.

A petition from Richard T. Cheseldine, of Montgomery county, praying an act of insolvency, was preferred, read, and referred to the committee appointed on the petition of Chamberlaine and Magruder.

The bill for the relief of James Colquhoun, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate by the clerk.

The bill to authorise Benjamin Ray, junior, to collect the balances due him as sheriff and collector of Montgomery county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate by the clerk.

The bill, entitled, A supplementary act to an act to lay out and establish a road from the city of Annapolis to the city of Washington, and to repeal the act therein mentioned, was read the second time by especial order, passed, and sent to the senate by the clerk.

The amendment to the bill for the relief of John Charles Francois Chirac, was read the second time, and the question put, That the house agree thereto? The yeas and nays being required, appeared as follow:

On motion, Leave given to bring in a bill, entitled, An additional supplement to the act, entitled, An act for the establishment and regulation of the levy courts in the several counties of this state. ORDERED, That Mr. Nelson, Mr. Kemp and Mr. Dorsey, be a committee to prepare and bring in the same.

Mr. T. Davis, from the committee, delivers to the speaker a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act for the relief of sundry insolvent debtors; which was read the first and second time by especial order and passed.

On motion, ORDERED, That the committee on expiring laws have leave to bring in a bill to continue the several laws mentioned in their report.

The clerk of the senate delivers a bill, entitled, An act relative to the jurisdiction of the court of appeals, endorsed; "By the senate, December 13, 1800: Read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.
