Sec. 9. It shall be the duty of the proprietor or manager of every store at the request of the clerk or clerks authorized to issue the license to furnish such clerk or clerks with a statement in writing under oath, setting forth the amount of the different classes of goods, wares and merchandise which are kept and had for sale in such store during the principal seasons of sale.

Sec. 10. All Acts and parts of Acts inconsistent with the provisions of this Act are hereby repealed.

Sec. 11. There being no law now existing on the subject provided for in this Act, although the necessity therefor has long existed, creates an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution, therefore this Act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage."

Which proposed amendment was ordered to be printed. On motion of Mr. Applegarth,

The Senate reconsidered its action by which

Senate bill No. 245, entitled "An Act to repeal sections 10 A, 42, and to repeal and re-enact with amendments sections 1, 2, 3, 8, 9, 11, 12, 14, 15, 19, 22, 34, 36, 40, 57, 58, 59, 60, 62, 63, 66 and 67 of Article 72 of the Code of Public General Laws, title 'Oysters.'"

Was ordered to be engrossed for a third reading.
