

1 executive branch, and there are a number of exceptions
2 and the President has the right to eliminate whatever he
3 thinks may be detrimental, and we also heard of a number
4 of private areas where statistical information is given,
5 where various information is provided to the government
6 for research and for methods of future planning, which
7 if turned loose to the public would be in effect a very
8 serious breach of confidence.

9 Ladies and gentlemen, I think most of you know
10 how you want to vote on this thing. I simply hope that
11 you will adopt the amendment that I suggest, because I
12 believe that it does reiterate the concept of this body that
13 the public does have a right to know, but let's don't open
14 the floodgates.

15 I urge the adoption of this amendment.

16 THE CHAIRMAN: Does any delegate desire to speak
