2 I would like to remind this Convention that the
3 short-lived Constitution of 1864 went into some detail,
4 as Delegate Pullen has said, and it was then all changed
5 in 1867, and I would say to you that the changes that have
6 occurred are a tremendous tribute to that legislature which
7 some of us seem to hold in such little esteem.

8 THE CHAIRMAN: You have one-half minute, Dele-
9 gate Jett.

10 DELEGATE JETT: In our opinion, it is absolutely
11 essential that we do not freeze the framework within which
12 education operates, that we don't set up any State board
13 with a control, that we do not set up any geographic
14 situations, but that we leave education free to be the
15 concern of every man, woman and child in this State.

16 THE CHAIRMAN: Delegate Wheatley.

17 DELEGATE WHEATLEY: Mr. Chairman, before we
18 begin, an opinion of parliamentary inquiry. Is this to be
19 treated as an amendment rather than an amepdment to the
20 amendment?
