

1 line 1 and 2 and 3, the phrase "at any time" should appear
2 after the word "appoint". That is the phrase "at any
3 time" in line 3. It should be moved up to line 2 following
4 the word "appoint".

5 THE PRESIDENT: I would suggest it would
6 read better if you said "may at any time appoint".

8 DELEGATE CLAGETT: I agree.

9 THE PRESIDENT: Is there any objection to
10 modifying the phrase in lines 2 and 3 to transfer the
11 phrase "at any time" in line 3 to line 2 after the word
12 "may", inserting the proper punctuation?

13 Delegate Miller, I know you are splitting the
14 verb. Do you still object?

15 DELEGATE EDWARD MILLER: The Style Committee
16 objects.

17 THE PRESIDENT: Which do you prefer?

18 Delegate Clagett.

19 DELEGATE CLAGETT: "May appoint at any time".
